Someone once said that learning is the primary purpose of going to school. To this end, Borgess does fulfill this purpose. But education is more than attending classes. Students not only learn in classes; they learn through varied experiences, whether they be from their own or the experiences of others. The Borgess faculty brings to this school a myriad of backgrounds and personalities. The Borgess student body does likewise. This melting pot can produce conflicts, friendships, a basis for understanding, and devotion. All of this is learning.

To say that teachers only teach and students only learn is illogical. Learning implies a give and take in experiences and knowledge. The Borgess teachers learn from their students as well as

teach them.

This section, Academics, presents the Borgess faculty. Classes are designed to appeal to both the college bound student and the student who seeks a general education. Borgess' flexibility allows a student to adapt his course of work to his particular situation. This flexibility is evident in the variety of courses offered in such departments as History, English, Religion and Science. The Religion and English departments for examples, have implemented team teaching in the freshman department, following the lead of the History and Science departments. The Religion and English departments each offered twenty-two different electives this past year. The History and Science departments have offered five and three electives respectively.

Although history concerns itself with the heritage of man, art and language also transcend the barriers of time. Student tours to Quebec and Mexico were of primary importance to language students because they were able to examine the customs and life styles of our neighbors. The art student learns to appreciate and interpret the environment around him. A. European tour, scheduled for this summer, allowed students to gain an insight into the

aesthetic contributions of countries overseas.

The Math and Business departments expanded by introducing students to new machinery. The Math department elective, Computer Science, utilized the computer from the Applied Computer Time Share Company in Southfield, Michigan. A new addition in staff, Mr. Michael Kowal, taught the students how to program in the different computer languages. The Business department's new machinery included three Selectric typewriters, designed to help students learn dictation procedures. In addition, Business Law and Personal Financial Management were among the new courses offered this past year.

Child development was taught this year by Mrs. Barbara Smith who replaced Miss Patricia Ringvelski in Home Economics.

The Guidance Department includes Miss Delores Kaczmarczyk, Mr. Ted Cafferty and Sr. Mary Ruth, a newcomer. Among the many functions of the Guidance Department, are four types of counseling: collegiate, occupational, personal and academics; scheduling, and both high school and college registration. Finally, the Guidance Dept. acts as a liaison for students in their relationships with the school, the teachers, and their parents. Secretary of the Guidance Department is Mrs. Eleanor Gendjar, who takes care of all the clerical work.

Mrs. Alice Allen and her able staff, Mrs. Lillian Jaroh and Miss Laura Spampinato were responsible for keeping the "opera-

tion" running smoothly.

And when the operation is running smoothly, then Borgess















utumn was a time for beginning here at Borgess which for the first time in Borgess history would not be highlighted by the class of '70. Finally, after four years, the role of leader was handed down to an anxious senior class of 1971.

The most urgent matter that Borgess had to face was Proposal C. Should public funds be used to support non-public schools? This was the issue, and Borgess took the stand that yes,

these funds should be used to support non-public schools.

But, in order to achieve our goal, the defeat of Proposal C, we had to wage battle and to do this we needed an army. So Borgess students took the initiative, and organized MSAC, calling upon the other parochial schools in the archdiocese to join the battle.

Countless thousands of bumper stickers, buttons, and signs calling upon citizens to "Vote No on C" became evident all over town in a matter of a few weeks.

And even though in the end we lost the election, Borgess

was not defeated.

While the battle against C was going on, Borgess was occupied on the fronts as well. Mr. Fred Mushinski, replacing Mr. Pat Uetz as head football coach, and his assistants, Mr. Jim Brisky, Mr. Dennis Brisky, and Mr. Mike McCloskey worked to form a better varsity football team. Although their record showed 2-6-0, the Spartans made for tough competition.

Tri-captains Danny Burke, Kevin Downey, and John Steffy led their team in a true spirit of sportsmanship, dedication and de-

termination.

Three players won honors this past year in football. Junior Paul Banion received an All-State Honorable Mention, and Kevin Downey, a senior, was chosen as an All-League candidate. John Steffy, also a senior, in addition to All-League Selection, received the Most Valuable Player award for the varsity squad.


The Borgess Junior Varsity team enjoyed its second undefeated season this year as they retained an overall record of 10-2-0. The A-West Champs' defense boasted of allowing only six points all season. Mr. Stephen Strauch and Mr. John Kolf were the coaches of the Junior Varsity and their captains were Paul Doemer, Greg Drypen and Dan McManamon.

The Freshman football team, coached by Mr. Pat Mulcahey and Mr. Mike Meloche, showed promise with their 1-3-1 record.

Bishop Borgess was revered as the undefeated champions of the cross country course. No other school in the Catholic League could approach the Spartan's overall record of 14 consecutive victories over three seasons. The winners of the Catholic League A-West Championship, Detroit Catholic Varsity Cham-pionship, and the State Regional Championship, were runners from all grade levels who put forth the drive that made the Borgess Cross Country Team victorious.

Head coach, Mr. Brian Schwall, and his assistant, Mr. Tom Kennedy, worked together in coaching both Varsity and Junior Varsity squads. Taking All-City honors were co-captains Rick Jacobs and Al Rewekant, in addition to Jim Gavin and Bob McCar-

The Junior Varsity's record this year was a commitment to the future. The J.V. went undefeated for the 1970 season in three invitational meets, the Lipke Invitational, the Southgate Invitational, and the Catholic League Championship. But the really fantastic thing about the Junior Varsity was that they not only won the Catholic League Championship but scored a shutout doing it. During the season, various members of the J.V. squad were called upon to run in varsity competition. Keeping the J.V. record in mind, it is certain that Borgess will have a strong Cross Country team for a long time to come.

On October 30, 1970, Bishop Borgess initiated another tradition, Homecoming. Reigning in Borgess' first Homecoming were Queen Debbie Young and her court made up of seniors Kathy Papi and Laura Gawronski, junior Carol Rokicki and sophomore Mary

Abramczyk.

Students and alumni alike had looked forward to this occa-

sion for a long time.

At nine o'clock, the queen and her court made their entrance up the center aisle amid many smiling faces and flashing cameras. After Queen Debbie Young welcomed the alumni back at Borgess, everyone joined in dancing to the music provided by Insanity's Horse.

On Sunday, November 1, 1970, Borgess faced Sacred Heart of Dearborn at Thurston field for our first homecoming

game.

The game, even though it ended in defeat for Borgess, was

very close, 14-7.


The theme at the half-time ceremonies was the "Defeat of Proposal C and the Shamrocks." Many homerooms decorated cars in this spirit and each class entered a float. For the second year in succession, the class of '71 won the float competition with a submarine torpedoing "C" and the Shamrocks.

In mid November, the theatrical abilities of Borgess' students were once again displayed in the hilarious comedy, "Charley's Aunt." Junior Craig Scott played the dazzling impersonation of Charley's Aunt from Brazil. The farce unraveled when the real aunt, played by Cynthia Grywalski, discovers her imposter smoking a cigar. Behind the scenes, stage and prop crews helped to make the production a success.

The Pep Club at Borgess worked hard to promote a spirit of sportsmanship in the student body. In order to raise the money to have an athletic banquet in the spring, the Pep Club sponsored the sale of "We're No. I" buttons.

With the assistance of the Michigan State and University of Detroit cheerleading squads eliminations were held and the final varsity team of eight girls and two boys were chosen along with a Junior Varsity six-girl squad. Varsity captains Kathy Papi and Kathy Hull and Junior Varsity captain Mary Abramczyk led the girls in hard practice, with the emphasis on precision. 









their talent.



advised the activities of the students.



offers to worthy students.













Spartan Frosh finished the season with an 8-2 conference record, a complement to the Varsity and Junior Varsity Performances. Mr. John Kolf, who coached the freshmen, felt that his team had outstanding varsity potential in the form of Joe D'Arcangelo, Mike Milosh, Joe Dillon, Glen Varlesi, Rick Davis and Pete Shaheen. A stellar showing by batter Rick Davis, and no-hit pitchers Reese Dobrick and Joe Dillon, spiced team play.

Girl Baseballers surpassed the men when it came to team records. Miss Collins' Spartan gals attained a first place league standing. Outstanding play was topped by fine showings from Captain Nancy Itnyre, Denise Murray, Debbie Young, Arlene Matzke, and Vicki Jung. All team members deserve equal credit for the excellent season, including manager, Claudia Graham. Bishop Borgess' impressive Girls Baseball league standing for four years reads 20-4.

It is certainly true that Borgess boasts some star athletes, but track seems to top most of them. Track is the high point of the spring season. Mr. Schwall, who is leaving us next year, and Mr. Strauch guided Spartan runners to their accustomed victories over tough opponents. Captains for the season were Ron Kozlowski, John Husek and Dennis Koltunchik. Student managers were Dave Forest and Dave Pendracki. The Spartan runners glided into a first place position in the A-West league, and were city runner-ups. Track stars to be commended for their great spirit and dedication are Borgess Man Al Rewekant, who set an All-City Catholic League record (2 mi. 9:38.8), and Dennis Koltunchik (All-City 100 yd. dash). Both Catholic League champs displayed an unmatched spirit. All-City for the 880 yard relay were Al Nemzek, Greg Battle, Tim DeBeliso, and Dennis Koltuchik, Greg Battle, second in low hurdles was another All-City man, as well as Al Nemzek, second in the 220 yard dash. Dennis Koltunchik, who was voted most valuable player, upset the Catholic League champ as the 1970 City Finals, in a regular dual meet. The champ was beaten only twice in three years in the 100 yard dash, by Dennis, of course. Long lean Dan Pehrson, who has remained undefeated in the A-West for three years, placed third in the city meet with a time of 1:57.8 for the 880 yard run. Other records included a time of 44.9 for the 440 relay run by Dennis Koltunchik, Al Nemzek, Kevin Kleinsmith and Tim DeBeliso. Bishop Borgess won the Catholic League Reserve Championship by an overwhelming score. They also won the Catholic League Frosh Invitational sponsored by De La Salle.

Sister Ann Christopher's girl runners, captained by Jan Chezick, finished the season with a commendable record. Despite the fact that there is no league for girls track, Spartan ladies worked up to their expected potential, graciously accepting victories and the few defeats. School records were set by Jan Chezick, Anne Klein, Pat Paja, from Cody High School, and Didi Skrzyski, and every member of the team deserved a star for good sportsmanship.

Mr. Mulcahy, the tardiest coach in yearbook history, and his golfers tied for third place in the league. A relatively new team, the Spartan Golfers are composed of two seniors, five juniors, two sophomores and four freshmen. They will surely be getting more well-earned recognition in years to come.


















## '72, '73, '74

he second graduating class of Bishop Borgess High School showed an unmatched dedication when they donated a 1200 dollar sum to the fight to defeat Proposal C in the fall elections of 1971. Even though this was their last year, the seniors wanted to assure upcoming classes that a good education was available to them. Their continued involvement and generosity was sure proof that Bishop Borgess meant something to them, and would for many

Even if organization and unity were sometimes lacking, students were aware of an ultimate goal — the achievement of academic perfection and the development of Christian attitudes by means of work, leadership and service.

The upperclassmen manifested an almost endless supply of spirit this year. Activities ranged from the sale of ordinary bagels to a fruitful effort by the "Third Army" to clean the Harbinger office. These devoted soldiers were under the command of "General" F. Forest.

American government, a requirement for fourth year students, was an opportunity for the seniors to visit the governmental institutions of their multifaceted city. Included in the regular course of study were trips to the City County Building, the Wayne County Jail, the Common Council, and Recorders Court.

The annual road rally, a year-end event at Borgess, was an out-of-the-ordinary attraction for skilled drivers and capable clue decipherers. The combination enabled winning driver, Kent Aitchison, to take the prize for the rally after a ninety mile, three hour drive. At a picnic afterwards, seniors got together and compared notes on the expedition.

Honors were bestowed on deserving students at the May 29th convocation. A May Crowning Court composed of seniors led off the procession by presenting red roses to a statue of the Virgin Mary. Having donned their caps and gowns, with parents watching, selected seniors, and other juniors, received awards ranging from scholastic writing to forensics. And, at this most honored occasion, Miss Karen Kosinski received recognition for her reception of the highest public speaking award ever bestowed on a Michigan student — first place in interpretative reading at the National Forensics Tournament in New Orleans, Louisiana. Both Barb Budde and Tom Farrell, a junior, made the finals also.

A year-end brunch was given to the seniors by the Junior class. At this baccalaureate luncheon, upperclassmen were treated to a chicken a la king meal as they conjured some fine memories of past life at Borgess. The solemnity of departure was overshadowed by the joy of anticipation and a knowledge that

the future was just around the corner.

The annual Senior Prom was again held at the Raleigh House. This final celebration, complete with satin garters and formal invitations was the culmination of four years at Borgess. After an exotic roast prime rib beef dinner, with baked alaska for dessert, couples danced to the music of The Blue Notes.

Finally, on June 11, 1971, The Class of 1971 received their diplomas at a ceremony held at the Ford Auditorium. Valedictorian Cecilia Farina, and Salutatorian Barb Budde left their fellow classmates with some thoughts on the past years achievements and failures. They were two very worthy examples of hard work, a quality often equated with graduating classes of Bishop Borgess High School. The graduation audience witnessed the return of a very dear and honored friend, Fr. Thomas J. McAnoy. The ex-principal spoke on the vivid contrast between wealth and poverty, and the need for dedicated young men and women to remedy the situation.

It seems that the word "years" comes into play quite often in the Senior Section. When referring to the graduating class of a high school, we often think of four years well-spent. There is a certain finality connected with the conclusion of these four years, but none which supercedes the finality of the

statement: The future lies ahead.










