Two roads diverged in a yellow wood, And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveler, long I stood And looked down one as far as I could To where it bent in the undergrowth;


Then took the other, as just as fair, And having perhaps the better claim, Because it was grassy and wanted wear; Though as for that the passing there Had worn them really about the same,
























ACADEMICS





Mr. Marc Baron, chairman of the dept. along with nine other teachers, use various techniques in the classroom such as mapping, current events, magazines, and open discussion.



The Science Department has started several experimental programs. An independent study program used in Introductory Science offers students from different grade schools a chance to fill in their science background while working at their own rate.


Nursing Chemistry is available for students going into nursing. Biology is now offered at two levels, Basic and General, either for students picking up their credit or for those going on in science.






















Once again Bishop Borgess students used their imagination and creativity in the Christmas door decorating contest. Electric lights were not permitted because of the energy crisis.






Bishop Borgess Third Annual Dance Marathon was held April 16th in the cafeteria. Seven couples entered the Marathon which was sponsored by the Student Council.










There was no trouble getting fans to the games and their enthusiasm affected the entire squad.




Frosh Win With Stingy Defense And Awesome Scoring Punch


























Juniors hard work pays off as judges declare their "funny" float the best

The juniors started their third year off on the right foot and all looked hopeful for it to continue that way.





Someone we have loved very much, Kim Dudek, is no longer with us. Your feelings now reflect how tenderly and deeply Kim was able to enter into your lives. She was a person who cared — she was a person who enriched our lives.

We feel the heaviness of sorrow and emptiness move through our bodies, but let us also try to focus our minds on the real meaning of her death. Her death is not the end — her death is a new beginning because she has been called home by her loving Father."
