To where it bent in the undergrowth;






Had worn them really about the same,



And that has made all the difference.




The students and the teachers in the Language Department strive together in the advancement of the languages. They have the advantage of benefitting from the language lab, which is quite effective in that it presents the students with an opportunity to hear another person speak fluently in his native tongue.

Sr. Rosalie, head of the dept., believes that, "Taking a language as an elective is important because possessing knowledge of a second language can be beneficial in travelling and communications."

The wide range of classes offered by the Social Studies Dept. are aimed at correlating the past and present. Anthropology, for example, explores man's pre-civilization days in the hope that more may be learned about man's development in order to better understand the situation he is in now. Other curriculum offerings include Sociology, Government, Psychology, American History, and World History.

Mr. Marc Baron, chairman of the dept. along with nine other teachers, use various techniques in the classroom such as mapping, current events, magazines, and open discussion.





These machines have improved the training that the students receive in the Department, and have greatly advanced their chances for a good job after graduation.


Mini-Courses, Jan. 7-18, Offered Something For Everyone















































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
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
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
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

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Well, Volume 5 is complete. Many times amidst the havoc of missed deadlines I proclaimed the end to be in early June, however, in reality it came a month later.
